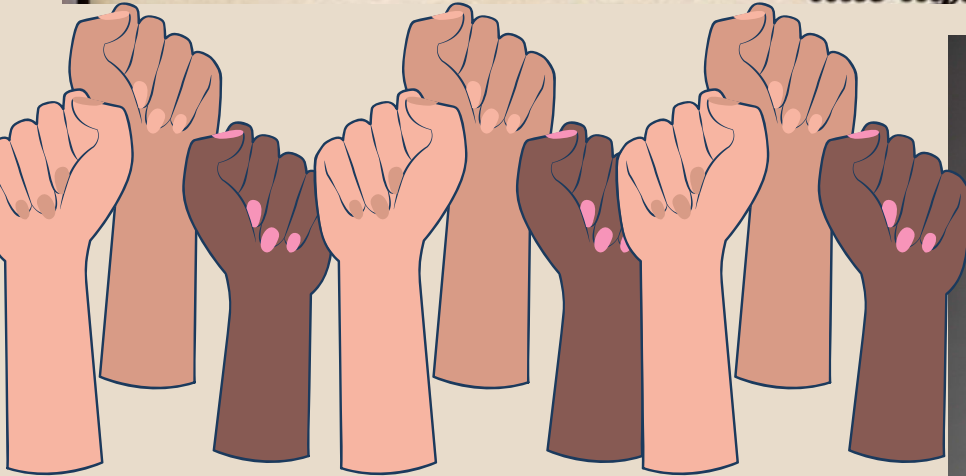

Kamala Harris became the second African American and the first South Asian American woman to win a seat in the U.S. Senate. She declared her candidacy for the 2020 U.S. Presidential Election. 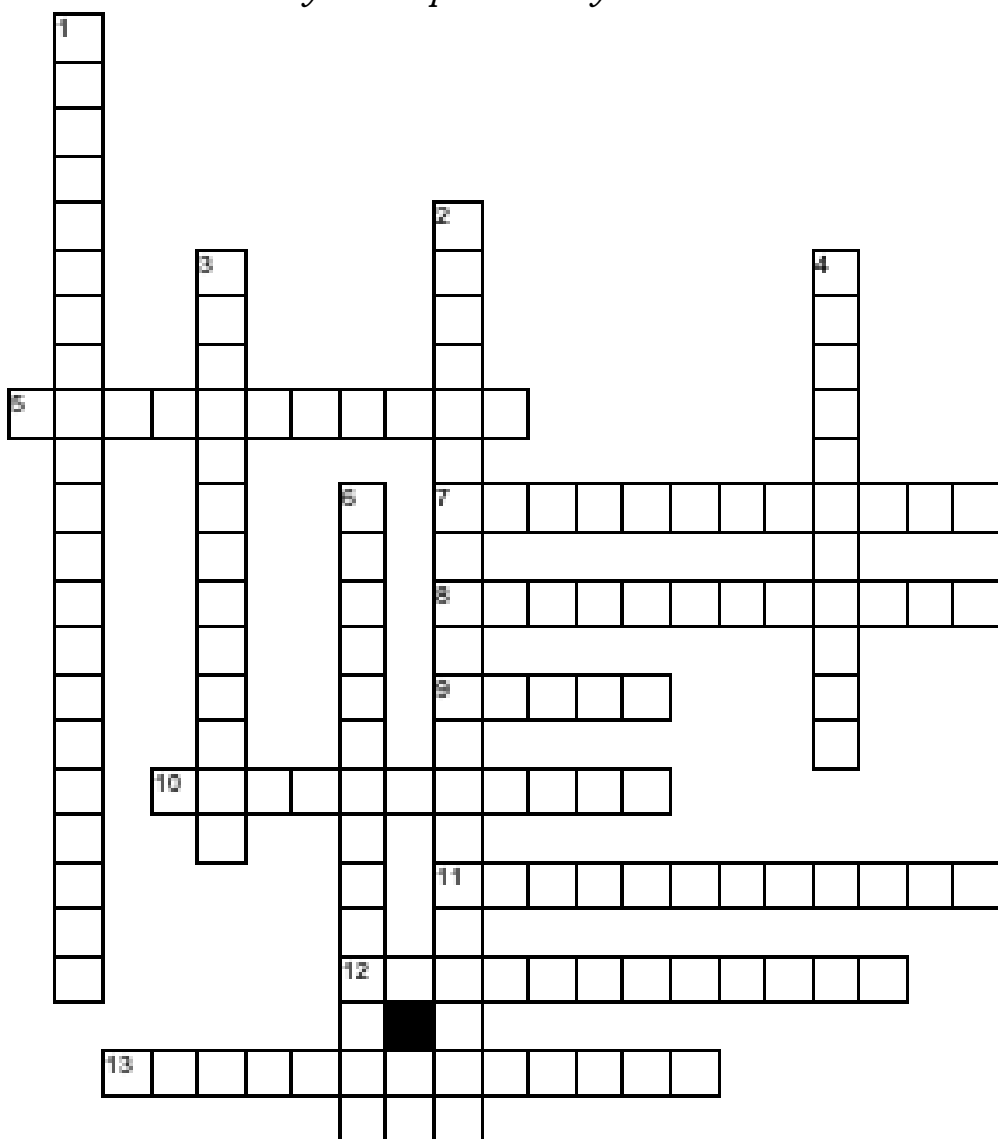

STRONG WOMEN IN POLITICS

This year for the observance of Women's History Month we would like to celebrate Black women and their achievements. First, we celebrate our historic election. The first Black and South Asian woman to become Vice President of the United States, Kamala Harris.

Next, we celebrate Stacey Abrams who founded Fair Fight Action, an organization to address voter suppression. Her hard work and dedication to the 2020-21 election gave Democrats control of the Senate. Abrams was nominated for a Nobel Peace Prize for her efforts in the 2020 election.

Shirley Chisholm was an American politician, educator and author. She became the first Black woman elected to the United States Congress representing New York's 12th district for seven terms from 1968-1983. Shirley Chisholm became the first African-American candidate for a major party's nomination for President of the United States, first woman to run for the Democratic Party.

Harriet Tubman, American abolitionist and political activist. Born into slavery, escaped and made rescue missions to rescue about 70 enslaved people, using antislavery activists and safe houses known as the Underground Railroad.
